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Aim:

How can we evaluate political cartoons from the 2008 election?

Objectives:

Students will be able to:

- Explain 2 ways political cartoons influence the public debate on issues.
- Examine 2 political cartoons using the analysis form developed by the National Archives. (http://www.archives.gov/education/lessons/worksheets/cartoon_analysis_ worksheet.pdf)

Level: High School

Do Now:

- 1. What are two major stories in the news today?
- 2. What are the symbols for the Democratic and Republican parties?

Discussion Points:

- Are people influenced by political cartoons today?
- How do political cartoons add to the public debate on important issues?
- Do the political cartoons in the newspaper always reflect the point of view of the newspaper?
- What should you look for when you interpret the meaning of a political cartoon?

- 2. Describe one political cartoon from the 2008 election and explain how it created a favorable or unfavorable view of a candidate.
